

## Sunday 24th March 2024



'Ride on, ride on in majesty! Hear all the tribes hosanna cry;

O Savior meek, pursue Your road with palms and scattered garments strowed'.

These words are from the first Stanza of the famous hymn written by Henry H. Milman around 1827. I am not sure when he penned the words, but he knew people would be singing them many years later. Or even if he expected it to be sung in Saint Mary's Oatlands in 2024! The words are appropriate for the event on what we now call Palm Sunday over 2000 years ago.

On this day, Jesus entered Jerusalem, knowing it was a place of danger and his earthly life would end in painful circumstances.

I often wonder what was going through his mind as he rode the donkey. Was he frightened? Dismayed? Disappointed? or even happy knowing that he will soon return to his throne in heaven? We cannot know, but the Bible gives us various indications. Last Sunday, we read from Saint John's gospel (John 12:20-33), where Jesus said how much his soul is troubled. He must have felt the agony of what was about to happen. If there is any doubt that Jesus was fully human and fully God, this passage reminds us that this is the case. Many of us can empathise with this feeling. It is deeply human. Hugh reminded us in his excellent sermon last Sunday, "Whenever we feel threatened in any way, we have to decide whether to run away or stay and fight. Our body prepares us to determine by diverting the blood's rich oxygen supply to the muscles. Whether we fight or run, our body's muscles are ready to respond immediately. The decision to fight or run is fundamental to the survival of animals and humans alike. It is sometimes impossible to run away, even if we want to. And fighting is not always the right thing to do—sometimes, the issue isn't worth the effort. There is a real art in knowing when to avoid trouble and when to face it head-on".

Jesus must have felt the same emotion as a human being, but he decided not to run away, not because he couldn't do a disappearing act, but because he knew the war of the Cross was the way to Resurrection and Eternal life. As someone once said, without the pains of Good Friday, there can be no joys of Easter Sunday. So, whatever the present pains and tribulations, let's "hang in" there, knowing full well that Easter is coming. Please join us on Sunday as we celebrate Palm Sunday. We will meet at 8 and 10 am for Holy Communion and at 6 pm for a Devotional Service to start Holy Week.

Next week is Holy Week, and we will meet on Wednesday at 10.30 am, Thursday for Agape Meal at 19.30, and Holy Communion with Foot Washing at 8 pm. On Good Friday, we will join our brothers and sisters from other journeys in Weybridge for a Walk of Witness that starts at Saint James Church at 10 am. There will be a reading and reflection service here at Saint Mary's from 1 pm, and the children are all invited to the Good Friday Easter Craft from 2 pm. I hope you can attend and worship with us.

May you be filled with the joy of Palm Sunday.
